On May 10th, 2024, Jadavpur University Student Chapter organized **"TERRATALES"** to commemorate World Earth Day. Under the guidance of our esteemed faculty advisor Dr. Anupam Ghosh, the office bearers of AAPG, SPG, SEG, along with active volunteers executed the mega-event. The event encompassed a total of eight activities—four held offline and four online. The submissions for online events were accepted prior to the offline event via email, which were displayed as an

exhibition at the event. Through the painting competition "EARTH'S CANVAS", artists expressed profound reflections of nature's beauty. In the creative writing competition "SYLVAN STORIES", participants recounted personal stories illustrating their deep bond with nature. Rempart Mountain, Mauritius. Located in the Rivière Noire (Black River) district near Tamarin, is a striking volcanic remnant with steep, rugged peaks reaching up to approximately 772 m.
